Naples police officer Mother, ex-wife continue pension fight

The court battle over at least \$100,000 in lifetime benefits for a Naples police

settlement provided. Nina Diaz Monroig, 35, of Marco Island, the ex-wife of Naples officer Dave Monroig, filed a response and counterclaim last week in Collier Circuit Court against Ivette Monroig, the officer's mother.

Both Nina Diaz Monroig's lawyer, Ray Bass, and Ivette Monroig's lawyer, Richard Inglis, contend it would be unconstitutional to rule for the other side.

Monroig, 37, shot himself in the head July 9 after shooting and injuring his girlfriend, Naples Police Sgt. Amy Young, 40, in her Estero home, according to an autopsy and Lee sheriff's report.

The Monroigs ended up in court after their attorneys argued before the Naples police and general pension boards. They were working on a settlement to share half of the pension, but Nina Diaz Monroig then sought all, prompting the board's trustees to file a complaint last month to ask a circuit judge to determine the rightful beneficiary.

The board's attorneys believe the benefits should go to Ivette Monroig, 56, of Naples.

Although the divorce was final in August 2013, Dave Monroig never changed the beneficiary he designated when he was hired in 2004 — his ex-wife.

Debra Shanahan honored for community service

One of Marco Island's most notable citizens leaned forward to hear her name called.

Then the room erupted into applause as Debra Shanahan was called to the podium to be honored as the Naples Daily News 2014 Citizen of the Year for Marco Island.

With Sunday's award, given at the Bistro Soleil on Marco Island, Shanahan became the first woman to win both the Marco Eagle Volunteer of the Year in 2010 and the Citizen of the Year. Since 1991, Dave Rice Sr. had been the only dual

Shawna Devlin, vice president of advertising for the Naples Daily News, presented the award with T.J. Boone, manager of the Marco Eagle.

Boone took several moments to re-

veal Shanahan's identity, using a series of clues, including contributions to the community. When the focus narrowed to Shanahan, she appeared the most surprised.

That was in character, said Monte Lazarus, a past recipient. He described Shanahan as a person who accomplishes a great deal without seeking publicity or

Shanahan admitted her desire to play supporting roles until her recent marriage.

"I never wanted to be out front, then I married Dick Shanahan," she acknowledged after receiving the award.

Dick Shanahan is a former Collier County Commissioner and a previous recipient of the Citizen of the Year award. In 2001, Debra Shanahan helped form

organization." For \$20, attendees could shop for new, high-end clothing and jewelry, snack on finger food, sip Champagne and socialize at the Naples Square Sales Gallery, all while helping the Shelter for Abused Women & Children and Options Thrift Shoppe, which is owned by the shelter.

"It was so close to the shelter, it just made perfect sense," said Wanda Cross, director

Beightol, who brought her daughter Caera, 16, along, said she came out to the "Light Up Your Holidays" benefit to "put her money where her mouth is."

"I like the fact that you're buying clothes for yourself but you're helping women and children at the same time," Caera said.

By 3 p.m. — the halfway mark of the two-hour affair — \$5,000 had been raised, exceeding the original \$4,000 goal. Klein said 100 percent of the money received from ticket sales would go directly to the shelter.

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3 struck, killed after stopping to help driver who hit bear

Three people were reported dead Sunday after they stopped to help a driver who had hit a bear on Snake Road, north of I-75.

The accident happened at about 7 p.m. Sunday, when the Broward County Sheriff's Office responded to a crash involving a bear.

According to a Seminole Police

Department spokesman, a car hit a bear on Snake Road. A second car, the official said, stopped to assist.

Three people then were struck by a third car, and all were killed.

Several other people also were injured, the official stated, but it was unclear how many at the
